Economics analyzes how societies provide for their well-being, and examines the choices and trade-offs that are made in the face of limited resources. It studies the competition and cooperation that arises among individuals, private organizations, and governments in the process of allocating scarce resources to a variety of different uses in society.

Economics is widely recognized as a solid background for many jobs and professions in business, financial services, government and law. Graduate level studies can lead to university teaching positions, independent consultancies, and research.
