RETHINKING THE MAPUCHE HISTORY Novement Interest Resilience Adaptor





Towards the end of the 19th century, the Argentine state developed violent military campaigns to occupy the indigenous territories of the Pampas and Patagonia and subdue their inhabitants. This process also involved strong historiographic operations that sought to legitimize the actions of expropriation and extermination. Throughout much of the 20th century, these representations remained unquestioned by national historiography and obstructed research into the political and economic dimensions that characterized border relations. In this presentation, I will identify the main historiographic "myths" inherited by academic history and the recent contributions of Ethnohistory that allow us to question them.

Ingrid de Jong is a Researcher at the Consejo Nacional de Investigaciones Científicas Técnicas (CONICET) of Argentina and a Professor at the Universidad de Buenos Aires. Her academic production focuses on the Historical Anthropology of border diplomatic relations and the territorial, parental, and economic dimensions of indigenous leadership and political alliances in Pan-Araucanian space.
