# **Fundraising Priorities**

The UWF continues to focus its development efforts on supporting UWinnipeg's Student Awards, Work-Integrated Learning, the Collegiate and Indigenization priorities in alignment with their Strategic Directions. All UWF fundraising efforts are coordinated through our Major Gifts, Individual Giving, Planned Giving, Collegiate Engagement and Donor Stewardship programs.

### Student Awards

### The Opportunity Fund

At UWinnipeg, 13 per cent of incoming students identify as Indigenous and almost one-third of the student body identifies as coming from a racialized community. The Opportunity Fund was established to assist students who are traditionally under-represented in higher education by removing barriers and making UWinnipeg as accessible and welcoming as possible.

### Youth-In-Care Tuition Waver Program

The Opportunity Fund Youth-In-Care Tuition Waiver Program provides opportunities for youth in foster care who are predominately First Nations and Métis to pursue post-secondary education. Students in this program



will have their tuition fees waived by UWinnipeg, and the Manitoba child welfare authorities helps cover living expenses including housing, textbooks and meal plans, for current or former wards.

### Work-Integrated Learning

UWinnipeg knows that work-integrated learning builds workforce capabilities, as well as the skills and individual prospects of students as members of the community and Canada's labour force.



Many UWinnipeg students take part in co-op programs, internships, field placements, or some other form of experiential learning or "workintegrated learning." The UWF's fundraising supports UWinnipeg's goal of expanding students' access to experiential opportunities by offering new programs within a variety of departments.

### The Collegiate

The Collegiate is committed to offering Grade 9, 10, 11, and 12 students the opportunity to enroll in high school programs that aids their transition to post-secondary education. It also supports students in their pursuit of academic excellence and accessibility, in an environment of critical thinking and community spirit.

**Dean's Continuing Scholarship Fund** Many students begin their journey at the Collegiate supported by its strong entrance scholarship program and the Dean's Bursary Fund. With many students' first-year expenses covered, the Collegiate has established the Dean's Continuing Scholarship Fund to better aid students in their second, third, and fourth years of study.

### The Collegiate 150 Scholarships

These are awarded to students who have achieved 90 per cent or higher academic averages. This scholarship ensures the best and brightest are not only able to attend the Collegiate but can enter with pride knowing their hard work has been recognized.

### Wii Chiiwaakanak Learning Centre

The Wii Chiiwaakanak Learning Centre provides culturally relevant and integral programming to support and nurture the surrounding community. The Centre was built to provide an educational gathering place that is

The Model School at the Collegiate provides students with the opportunity and the support needed to graduate inclusive and accessible.

All the Centre's programs are free of charge and open to all families and individuals regardless of age, knowledge, or ability. This includes an



open curriculum Indigenous STEAM Camp, STEM Explorers and Indigenous Craft Group for children as well as family programming such as the Powwow Club and Women's self-defense.

### **Duff Roblin Scholars Fund**

In 2007, the UWinnipeg honoured Duff Roblin with the creation of The Duff Roblin Scholars Fund. It was designed to anchor and enhance the governance potential of the next generation of Manitobans. It also contributes to a future of hope for all people of Manitoba by providing Graduate Student Fellowships in Indigenous Governance.

Throughout the past 16 years, the fund has expanded to support students in UWinnipeg's innovative Master's in Development Practice: Indigenous Development program. Those who graduate from this program enter the world equipped with the skills to create positive change in both their communities and around the globe.

### **Endowment Fund Performance**

### Investing in the UWF Endowment Fund

At arms-length from UWinnipeg and with an independent Board of Directors, the UWF holds money from our donors in trust with the promise of prudent, diversified, and responsible investing.

In 2021, the main portfolio manager stewarding the UWF's investments became a signatory of the Net Zero Asset Manager Initiative (NZAM), which is an international group of asset managers committed to supporting the goal of net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050 or sooner.

Additionally, the UWF's portfolio managers are also signatories of the United Nations' Principles of Responsible Investment.

### **Endowment Performance 2004–2024**

The UWF Endowment Fund generates revenues to support the University's Strategic Directions. Its resilience and growth are important in both the short- and long-term. When the Endowment Fund was transferred to the UWF on April 1, 2004, it grew from \$18,073,579 to \$61,586,730 in Contributed Capital and from \$21,017,304 to \$88,686,984 in Market Value by the end of March 31, 2024.

The UWF is responsible for 664 individual endowment funds. Each endowment fund owns individual units (shares) in the UWF unitized investment pool. When new endowment funds are created, or existing funds receive gifts, our investment managers purchase units in the pool based on the current unit value. This system allows for efficient management of pooled assets and a fair allocation of investment earnings, as each fund's share of the pool's returns is proportional to the number of units it holds.

### **Stability Reserve Fund**

The UWF can ensure reliable and consistent funding of UWinnipeg programs and awards by focusing on a carefully selected asset mix and the Reserve Fund. When investments are performing better than expected, the UWF Board will typically direct a portion of the surplus to the Stability Reserve Fund. This helps ensure a steady and predictable distribution of funds every year, even when markets are down, or investments are not meeting expectations.

The annual return at March 31, 2024 is 11.91%.

The income allocation for 2023/24 totaled \$2.39 million. This represents 4.25 per cent of the prorated contributed capital held in the Endowment Fund or agreed to percentage. The agreed to percentage for 2024/25 was determined at the UWF's Annual General Meeting and will remain at 4.25 per cent resulting in a gift to the University totaling \$2.6 million for the 2024/25 award cycle.

### 2023 Campus Campaign

Thank you to everyone who donated to the 2023 Campus Campaign. A total of 326 faculty, staff, retirees and other UWinnipeg and Collegiate members participated in the Campaign, contributing more than \$485,000 to 75 different funds.



### UWinnipeg's Role in the Downtown Community

The UWinnipeg is an institution defined by its location. Born in the downtown area, UWinnipeg has continued to grow throughout the last 150 years, spreading its roots from the Portage Avenue main campus across the Logan-CPR railyard and into Winnipeg's North End.

On Selkirk Avenue, one of the main roadways that spans multiple North End neighborhoods, sits Merchants Corner. Originally named the Merchants hotel, the building had developed a reputation in its later years as a hub for criminal activity. Keen to repurpose the crumbling building, the provincial government purchased the space and turned it over to UWinnipeg—thanks in large part to **Dr. Jim Silver**. of years as part of the Canadian University Service Overseas program, and I fell in love with it."

After starting as a professor at UWinnipeg in 1982, Jim taught political science for the first 25 years of his career. Focused on helping his students learn about the political landscape of urban environments and the conditions affecting the lives of those living in them, his passion for the inner-city helped define the course structure in the newly created Department of Urban


Jim is a political science graduate from 1975 who found himself working for his alma mater in the early '80s after receiving his Master's degree from Carleton and PhD from the University of Sussex in England. His career at UWinnipeg is closely tied to the development of Merchants Corner and the UWinnipeg Department of Urban and Inner-City Studies.

"Initially, I had no interest in teaching." says Jim. "But during my undergrad, I had the opportunity to teach in West Africa for a couple

and Inner-City Studies. "Before 2007, there was no Urban Studies Program that offered courses to students at UWinnipeg. The Institute of Urban Studies that had been established was for professional research, not undergraduates." says Jim. "With the creation of the Department, we wanted to incorporate inner-city teachings and viewpoints that our students would be interested in and that would lead to further learning and hands-on research opportunities. Our courses on poverty, law, and more specific topics like lowincome housing came to define the program."

Jim was one of the key figures who lobbied the provincial government to turn ownership of Merchants Hotel over to UWinnipeg, "I wanted the Department to be in a

prominent and easily accessible part of the North End ... for the inner-city students who might not be able to make it to the Portage campus on a consistent basis," says Jim. "Being able to teach in the area allows UWinnipeg to remain connected to the most vulnerable parts of our city and gives by sharing our space with high schools and other groups. The unique pairing we have developed with community partners in the area means we can help young individuals realize that post-secondary education is something they can attain."

A consistent donor since 1991, Jim has helped support a number of funds over the course of his 37-year tenure. The most recent being the Jim Silver Award, an endowment that provides financial support to a student in the Department of Urban and Inner-City Studies who is involved with their community and in need of extra funding to graduate.

"Lots of people who want to succeed at university can't for want of money, and bursaries play a big part in helping enable young people," says Jim.

The endowment was created and funded primarily by Mr. Michael Nesbitt, a businessman and colleague who was an important contributor to the development of Merchants Corner.

"I believe in what universities do, and I believe UWinnipeg is an outstanding institution with the ability to transform lives," says Jim.

Despite formally retiring, Jim continues to teach part time at Merchants Corner, helping first year students make a successful start in their university career.

### **Beloved Biology Instructor** Remembered in New Bursary

On February 10, 2021, Nancy Loadman, former instructor, experiential scientist, and beloved member of UWinnipeg's Biology department, passed away. Having served the scientific community at UWinnipeg for 35 years, Nancy was well known by students and faculty alike.

During her tenure, Nancy spent a sabbatical with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans' Freshwater Institute, working at the Rockwood Fish Hatchery near Teulon, Manitoba.



She also attended the Association for the Sciences of Limnology and Oceanography Conferences, where she presented research alongside her colleagues throughout the United States. She later served as a scientific advisor for the Lake Winnipeg Foundation spending many summers sampling parts of Lake Winnipeg for UWinnipeg

aboard the Namao research vessel. A hands-on teacher who loved sharing her passion for the natural world with her peers and those enrolled in her biology classes, Nancy helped introduce a generation of students to the joys of field research and laboratory work.

When a loved one is lost, families often look for a way to keep their memory alive in the spaces where they once lived and worked. In keeping with her legacy as a dedicated educator, Nancy's family worked with the UWF to create the Nancy Loadman Memorial Bursary. Designed to provide for the students she cared so much about during her lifetime, the bursary that bears her name will be awarded to biology students who "demonstrate an interest

in sustainability and biodiversity," two areas of study that Nancy and many of her colleagues in the department spent their careers trying to better understand and support.

The bursary will begin supporting students in the Fall of 2024, helping subsidize the cost of enrollment for two undergraduate students.

### Indigenous Language Fund Begins Life at UWinnipeg

When Dr. Glenn Moulaison began his second term as Dean of Arts in 2017, one of the goals he set out to achieve during his tenure involved revitalizing and strengthening the presence of Indigenous languages on campus.

Dr. Moulaison realized early on that developing supports for Indigenous languages was not only important to UWinnipeg's overall curriculum and strategic direction, but to the many Indigenous students and faculty members who believe language is

Dr. Moulaison. "For such a significant amount to be donated, it was important from the start that we find a worthwhile cause to invest in." As one of his last efforts as Dean. Dr. Moulaison set about working with faculty members, the History

at the heart of identity.

Help for this project came from a generous bequest left by Susan Buggey, a 1962–63 graduate of United College who chose to include UWinnipeg in her will. After passing away in 2015, UWinnipeg received a \$50,000 gift from her estate—with no strings attached.

"Undesignated funds from donors in this amount are a rarity, especially ones gifted to the Faculty of Arts," said

and Geography department Chairs, and Indigenous professors to develop an award that would see the \$50,000 put towards providing a "uniquely UWinnipeg experience" for recipients. After much discussion and collaboration, the Indigenous Land-Based Language Learning Fund was created in March of 2023 with the first round of recipients receiving funding in the spring of 2024. Falling in line with Dr. Moulaison's

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priorities as Dean, the fund is available to Indigenous faculty and students to provide monetary support for individuals looking to travel to Indigenous language camps across North America. Camps of this nature are often hosted by universities or private organizations and offer immersive language training for participants. Additionally, Elders and other skilled speakers work with those involved to develop their skills and understanding of Indigenous culture.

"This initiative will help defray the costsregistration, travel, etc.—related to land-based language-learning", says Dr. Moulaison. "I hope the fund will grow to have more take advantage of the opportunity. But even if it allows just a few to participate every year, I hope it is considered to be worthwhile. Anything that we can do in this area revitalization, preservation, promotion of Indigenous languages—we should do."

Sir William Stephenson Scholarship and the Dr. and Mrs. Roderick Hunter Scholarship Recipients

The Sir William Stephenson Scholarship and The Dr. and Mrs. Roderick Hunter Scholarship are two impactful and significant awards that support UWinnipeg students whose achievements echo across our campus, our city, and have the potential to positively impact the world.

These prestigious awards honour Sir William Stephenson's commitment to his country as an intelligence officer during the Second World War, and the dedication Dr. Hunter showed in supporting and guiding our campus durina his lifetime.

Each year, UWinnipeg Provost Dr. Pavlina Radia, along with Ian Restall, James G. Oborne, Leigh Taylor, and Janet Walker, the Trustees who

select the winners of the Sir William Stephenson and Dr. and Mrs. Roderick Hunter Scholarships meet at the UWinnipeg campus to learn more about the promising students who have applied for these scholarships.

The Trustees spend the day reviewing the eight finalist applications and interviewing the candidates in person who must demonstrate their skills as leaders, volunteers, and as outstanding academics.

This year, the Sir William Stephenson Scholarship was awarded to Taylor Cangemi and Gracie Grift, who are both fourth-year Honours Biology students. The Dr. and Mrs. Roderick Hunter Scholarship was awarded to Grace Harding, third-year neuroscience student, and Meagan Dutka, a fifthyear Conflict Resolution major. ### **Taylor Cangemi** Sir William Stephenson **Scholarship Recipient**

Taylor Cangemi is easy to spot on a volleyball court. Wearing her distinctive red libero jersey, she plays a key defensive role on her squad helped in part by her dedication to her fitness routine. Off the court, that dedication also carries over to her academics. The Calgary native is currently in her third season as a Wesmen and working through her 4th year as an Honours Biology student.

Taylor is proud of the bonds she's made with both her peers and professors in the science department and her teammates since moving to town.

"When I graduated from high school, UWinnipeg was not one of the universities on my radar. Initially, I didn't know what to expect," says Taylor. "After moving on my own in 2020 and starting classes during

the pandemic, I'm happy to say my teammates became my immediate family. Since then, I have come to love the campus and the relationships I have made within the faculty." Between volleyball seasons, she's hard at work as a research assistant, helping Dr. Craig Willis as part of the UWinnipeg Bat Lab, a group of researchers and students who study the behavior of and diseases that affect bat populations in Manitoba and Ontario. Drawing on her experiences with bats in the field. In addition to her time in the Bat Lab, Taylor also worked as a research assistant in Dr. Caleb Hasler's Fish Lab, helping Master's students with their projects.



### News from the Collegiate

Supporters of the Collegiate have long held that part of its success as a secondary school stems from the willingness of its faculty and staff to treat those enrolled as young adults-affording them the same level of respect and holding them to the same heightened expectations called for by their older peers attending UWinnipeg. This spirit, coupled with the school's unique curriculum is exactly what drew both Ken Rosenberg and his younger sister Roberta to Wesley Hall in the early '70s and '80s.

Despite being separated by a decade in age, Ken and Roberta's experience at the Collegiate shared a great deal in common. Moving from Shaftesbury High School in 1973, Ken wanted his senior year to

be different. "The freedom you were given as a Collegiate student shaped my experience as a student." says Ken. "My friends and I felt like we were part of a community, the atmosphere was different from most schools at the time."

For Roberta, before she passed away, the Collegiate was one of the last places that she was able to fully experience as a healthy young adult.

"I've always felt the school was a special place for her," says Ken. "She was an artistically minded, and civically engaged person who loved the people she learned from and learned with at the Collegiate."

After Roberta's passing in 1989, Ken and his brother Lewis sought to keep her memory alive through their charitable initiatives at Assiniboine Park, a place she loved.

"Growing up in Tuxedo, she regularly went to the Park and enjoyed its many gifts such as the Zoo, it's playgrounds and Art-in-the-Park. Giving to the Zoo's capital campaign in her honour was one way of preserving her memory and legacy," says Ken. "The Roberta Rosenberg Dean's Continuing Scholarship is another heartfelt way of remembering her as an adult someone who was passionate about sharing her creativity and sense of community with her friends, family, and peers during and immediately after her time at the Collegiate."

Established by Ken in the summer of 2020, the scholarship that bears Roberta's name is part of a larger collection of scholarships designed to recognize the academic skill of Collegiate students entering their second, third or fourth year of study. Under the umbrella of the Dean's Continuing Scholarship fund, memorial awards help the community honour past students, loved ones, and family members while also providing support for the promising academic

careers of students attending the Collegiate today.

"As alumni, many of us come to a point later in life where we want to help better the institution that was there for us during our formative years," says Ken. "Roberta's memorial scholarship is my way of helping make the Collegiate a stronger institution, to support these students now in the same way that many of our school's previous donors helped me. The Collegiate has been built in part by Alumni and I'm happy that Roberta's memory as a student here will benefit the school for years to come."
